



HB 1972 by Rep. Campos Supports Youth in Foster Care Facilities

Testimony to the House Select Committee on Youth Health and Safety

- → Ensures youth in foster care spend more time in loving homes with caring families instead of dreary, impersonal facilities with a high risk of abuse
- → Improves legal representation of youth in Residential Treatment Centers

Selective, brief use of Residential Treatment Centers (RTCs) can be appropriate — but youth are safer and thrive more in families:

- RTCs serve 13 or more children with mental health needs, including some youth in foster care.
- DFPS data show only 5% of children in Texas foster care are placed in RTCs but a third of children who
 experience abuse, neglect, or exploitation in foster care experience it in an RTC.¹
- Research from the Annie E. Casey Foundation shows that, overall, youth living in foster care facilities like RTCs are less likely to find a permanent home and less likely to graduate high school compared to youth with foster families, and the cost is up to 10 times more than placement with a family.²
- Serious safety issues have been highlighted in RTCs across Texas, such as Five Oaks in Austin County in 2018, and the Refuge in Bastrop in 2022.

The bill is based on the report commissioned by Sen. Kolkhorst's SB 1575 (87R):

- 26 experts collaborated with the Children's Commission to develop the recommendations.³
- The Senate Special Committee on Child Protective Services also recommended strengthening legal representation and judicial oversight in child welfare cases.⁴

This bill helps youth live with a loving family by ensuring judges proactively monitor the child's progress in the RTC and monitor the plan to quickly and successfully return the child to a family.
