Early Childhood Intervention


Caseload growth exceeds budgeted projections, resulting in funding per child below budgeted targets.

With the exception of a 2 percent reduction in fiscal year 2021 due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the number of children served by Early Childhood Intervention (ECI) has increased consistently for the past 10 years, while funding has not increased at the same rate.

The Texas Legislature funds the Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC), which in turn funds ECI contractors, based on a target number of children projected to be served each month. ECI contractors are required to offer the full array of services, as appropriate based on the child's and family's needs, to every eligible child, even if the number of children

determined eligible exceeds the target number of children in the contract. Additionally, due to method of finance constraints, in some years ECI is not able to access the full appropriated amount. Together, these factors have the effect of reducing the actual funding per child below the General Appropriations Act (GAA) target amount.

The 86th Legislature reversed a more than eight-year decline in the target funding amount per child, increasing the target to approximately \$433 per child in fiscal year 2020. However, as post-COVID demand is outpacing projections, the gap between actual funding per child and the GAA target is widening.
